

From the Pastor

A sudden snow and temperatures in the ‘teens in the middle of March! Who would believe a “sticking snow” after so warm a beginning? But what a delight. I hope you saw it in its afternoon aftermath. It looked like God had sprinkled powdered sugar over everything; it was fairytale beautiful. Sometimes I think we tend to take for granted or overlook the sheer beauty of our area, after all, when you live in one of the most beautiful counties and parts of the country, it’s easy forget the awe and pure wonder of the changing seasons with which God blesses us. Sometimes it’s important to remember to stop and to grin with the delighted amusement of a child, and to gaze at this awesome creation that the Almighty God has given to us.

The great Reformation theologian, Martin Luther, said that, “*There is no cross in a rainbow.*” By that he meant that although we can see God’s general handiwork in creation, we cannot discern the salvation that God offers us in the life and death of Jesus Christ. This is true. Just as looking at Leonardo Da Vinci’s famed “Last Supper” or “Mona Lisa” reveal a painting genius, but they do not reveal all aspects of the man himself—that he was also a sculptor, a linguist, an inventor, and an engineer. No, we see only a sample product of a phenomenal genius....but still, sometimes it’s pleasant to simply look at some of the “product.”

So, yes, Martin Luther was right, we cannot discern the saving grace of God by just looking at creation. However, what we can discern is a creator who loves color and light, who seems to delight in the soaring majesty of mountains, the intricate unfurling of a fern leaf, or the surprise of late spring snowfall.....a genius beyond our comprehension.

That same genius also emptied himself into us, to share with us one brief and holy life, in the person of Jesus, the anointed, the Messiah. He allowed his disciples to share in his life, to glimpse more than just the “product.” In Jesus, he offered us a glimpse of the genius himself. As Holy Week and Easter approach, we have a revered and ancient opportunity to share in the life of Jesus, exactly as his disciples did two thousand years ago. I encourage you to take advantage of this spiritual journey to glimpse the Master Genius, the Living God, and to grow closer God’s greatest gift, Jesus, Son of the Living God—our teacher, our shepherd, our king, and our Savior.

I encourage you to walk with us on Palm Sunday; through the daily Evening Prayer that follows; through Maundy Thursday, the stripping of the altar, and an hour or two in the Chapel of Repose that night; and to the Good Friday Celtic Stations of the Cross at noon, and the later powerful and solemn Good Friday evening liturgy. Each of these steps allow us to walk with Jesus, as his disciples did. They allow us a foretaste and glimpse into the sacrifice and meaning of Resurrection Sunday, Easter.


On Sunday, 3 Lent, I noted that “the only thing that can rob you of life is you!” It is never too late to choose a different path, to change direction in your life, because a new, fuller life begins the day we turn aside from the worries of the present and heed God’s call to love. God’s love song is there for anyone to see in a wondrous creation. It is there for those with “eyes to see” and “a heart to fill,” an opportunity to see not only the “product,” but also the Living God behind it.

For All the Saints...

Because April is usually the month of Holy Week and Easter many of the saints we recognize in April go unnoticed.

George Augustus Selwyn, Bishop of New Zealand, and of Lichfield, 1878 : April 11



Many people enjoy the rich, flowing language of the New Zealand Book of Common Prayer, which is written in both English and Maori, the language of the native Maori peoples in New Zealand and Melanesia. However, few people know that George Selwyn was the first Bishop of New Zealand. He was born on April 5, 1809 in London, educated at Eton and St. John's College, Cambridge, where he became a fellow. Upon ordination, he served as the curate at Windsor until his selection as the first Bishop of New Zealand in 1841. During his journey to the South Pacific, he mastered the Maori language and preached in that language upon his arrival. During the sporadic ten-year "New Zealand Wars," Bishop Selwyn deftly ministered to both sides, the British colonists and the Maori people, and retained the affection and admiration of all.

Five years later, Bishop Selwyn began missionary work throughout the Pacific islands of Melanesia.


Following autonomy from England, Bishop Selwyn used the structure and constitution of the American Episcopal Church for that of the New Zealand Church, a practice common to many of the English colonial Churches. Interestingly, Bishop visited the Episcopal Church in America two times and preached at our General Convention in 1874.

In 1867, following the first Lambeth Conference in England (a conference of Anglican Bishops), Selwyn reluctantly accepted the See of Lichfield in England. Bishop Selwyn died on April 11, 1878 and his grave in the cathedral of Lichfield remains a pilgrimage site for the Maori people for whom he first brought the gospel message

Alphege, Archbishop of Canterbury, 1012: April 19

Alphege was an Anglo-Saxon born in 954. He served as a monk and then later as the Abbot of Bath, until Archbishop Dunstan's influence elevated Alphege to the position of Bishop of Winchester in 984. In 994, Alphege brought the recently baptized Viking King Olaf Tryggvason to the English King, Aethelred, to make his peace and to be confirmed in the Church at Andover.

Alphege's successful ministry with the Vikings led to his election as the Archbishop of Canterbury in 1005. In 1011, during the second wave of Scandinavian invasion and settlement in England, Alphege was captured by the Danes for ransom. However, Alphege forbade a personal ransom to be collected from his already over-burdened people. Seven months later, despite the Viking commander Thorkell's effort to save the Archbishop's life by offering all his possessions, the Danes grew furious at the Archbishop's refusal to request any funds. In a drunken rage the captors dragged Alphege out in the night and brutally murdered him with the bones and horns of oxen. It was said that a Danish Christian convert, horrified by the brutality, intentionally dealt a fatal blow with an iron axe to the head. Alphege's remains lie under the High Altar of Canterbury. It was to Alphege's memory that Archbishop Thomas a Becket called out during his own brutal martyrdom before the High Altar of Canterbury 150 years later.





Nearly three million people have been displaced because of the warfare in Ukraine. *Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD)* has established a [“Ukraine Crisis Response Fund”](#) that is working directly with organizations on the ground in Europe.
